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Executive Summary

The Durham Catholic District School Board's Parent Involvement Committee held its kick-off meeting for the upcoming 2014-15 academic year on August 26th, 2014 at the Royal Ashburn Golf Club in Ashburn, Ontario. The all-day event comprised of a planning session and team building activity.

The parent-led advisory committee working within the Durham Catholic District School Board whose purpose is to encourage, support and enhance meaningful parent involvement to improve student academic achievement and well-being.

The retreat provided a forum for the 14 participants including Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (DCPIC) Executive, Parent Members, Director of Education and Director's Designate, Community Representatives, School Board Trustees, Principals' and Teachers' representatives to establish the plans and priorities for 2014-2015.

Participants worked from three documents:

- 1. Planning Report of 2013-14
- 2. Year End Report 2013-2014
- 3. Parent Survey Report 2013-2014

By reviewing these documents, the committee was able to see the past year's accomplishments, determine what needs to continue, the areas to be focused on and develop a plan and create the working sub-committees that will implement the plans.

The purpose of this session, for this committee, is to develop strategies in how to continue to engage parents in their children's education. The report will show the upcoming initiatives and events for the school year.



Call to Order of Strategic Planning Discussion

The Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (DCPIC) Members assembled at 1:15 PM. The Chair, Roxanne Horwitz, welcomed those present to DCPIC's strategic planning session – no introduction was necessary.

This meeting of the DCPIC members was not an official board meeting but rather a strategic planning session where the outcomes from the planning discussions are to be brought to the upcoming September committee meeting.

Strategic Plan 2013-2014 Review

Accomplishments and Action Items

- 1. **Tool Kit:** Contact with Catholic School Council (CSC) and personal contact was further improved and turned into a "rock" using the Tool Kit as a basis of conversation and building community. It was distributed on the first day during Orientation as this was the time when the new elected Chairs were forming their council and setting their goals. After Orientation, it was found that e-mails were not answered or their council e-mail was not set up. The plan for this year is to send a letter though schools and get their information as well face-to-face meetings will be necessary.
- 2. Marketing Materials: This year the DCPIC focused on branding heavily. As a result of wanting to increase visibility with school councils and parents. The committee ordered several items such as notepads, pens, totes, and developed a brochure(rack card) to hand out at events and meetings. As well, table signage such as banners and table covers with the DCPIC logo allowed the committee to present themselves better and professionally. It was used at the Ministry symposium, DCPIC events and meetings.
- 3. **Website**: The DCPIC website is considered a huge "rock" in terms of communications. The website was updated with all the current chairs. All school chairs were provided with e-mail addresses and is listed in the DCPIC website and their school website.
- 4. **School Councils:** School Councils were emphasized because parents are engaged as a result of these councils. Generating support for the CSC and informing parents of what they can do within the council was achieved. The plan is to approach schools that don't have DCPIC members on their councils. Going into the new school year, Council meetings will be on the school website. School Councils will be informed about the DCPIC's attendance to their meetings. The DCPIC member attending will contact the school chair and principal to ask to be included in the agenda. The DCPIC member will



provide the content for inclusion into the agenda as well as materials, which will be sent in courier bags.

It was agreed that for this year's goal, the Committee members should select one school in each region that doesn't have a representative attending school council meetings. The following is a proposed list of schools to visit in November:

- Pickering (St. Isaac Jogues)
- Ajax (St. Catherine of Siena)
- Whitby (St. Theresa & St. Marguerite D'Youville)
- Oshawa (Father Joseph Venini & John XXIII)
- North (Holy Family)

The schools listed above were selected as an outcome of the Parent Survey results. The DCPIC member(s) who will be attending the above school council meetings in November will be determined at the DCPIC September 11, 2014 meeting.

5. New Parent Member Recruitment:

Paulette Palumbo, Eileen Bright & Anita Colacicco have joined DCPIC this past school year.

It was pointed out that some parents are not aware of Regional Council as opposed to School Councils. Awareness of the existence of the regional council (DCPIC) continues to be a priority in the next couple of years. Parents' awareness could be boosted by the following methods:

• Open houses in September with banner, poster or brochure to hand out. Create a flyer stating, "Welcome Back! Here's the itinerary of our next meeting and topic of discussion." And post it on their fridge.



- E-mailing and inviting schools to join as was done with the chairs of St. Joseph (Oshawa) and St. Francis (Ajax) last year. A general agenda for the purpose of providing further clarity of the monthly meetings and to make parents more aware of what the DCPIC is doing will allow others to join the conversation would even encourage more to join. A reciprocal approach works by having a school council member come to DCPIC & vice versa.
- The use of Phone Trees is like face-to-face to reach parents. Whatever week the meeting was happening, parents are contacted. It's that personal touch that will get parents to attend.
- Make the formal meeting more inviting for the parents to be comfortable to
 participate and have input. Currently, it is still very formal with minutes, agenda
 and making motions. However, it was also noted that the structure of the
 meetings are necessary due to the DCPIC being a statutory committee of the
 Board.

Parent engagement is not just about attending meetings —it's about input. For example, at St. Patrick's meeting was well attended and that level of participation is required for all meetings. Parents and the committee to be informed via Twitter, website, meetings, and reaching a mass audience in the form of a newsletter.

6. Board Representation

The DCPIC needs to hear and know what is going on with the Board, and one way to do so is by attending public meetings. The goal is for a committee member to attend at least one meeting from each of the Board committees.

Trustee Stack will confirm if Audit Committee is open to the public. Regular board meetings are held on the 4thMonday of the month (10 were held):



The committees of the Board that host public meetings are:

- Policy Next board policy meeting October 7th
- o Special Education Advisory Committee (SEAC) Jim McGrorey is on this committee

- Regular Board Meeting September 30th
- 7. **Input to the Board** There are different committees that DCPIC is represented on. The board has performed well in addressing topics as a group. For example, if something is pressing, like provincial white papers, or recommendations needed to send off to the Ministry it could be handled by any parent. The committee cannot actually delegate to the board while sitting on board committees. Gerry is the resource and mechanism for the board.
- 8. **Presentations instead of delegation** Committee should provide to the board a presentation instead of delegation. For example, presentation on the Parent Survey to get on their schedule for October/November (ask Director O'Brien to be placed on agenda for 10 minutes)
- 9. Communications Means of communications used were newsletter, updated website, Twitter, branding tools such as pens to banners. There were quite a few things accomplished and done well (turning issues into a "rock") Facebook is the next step. More parent contact has become a rock.

Group Team Building Activity

The DCPIC Committee members participated in a group activity led by Tricia Dwyer-Kuntz, Coordinator of Assistive Technology with the Durham Catholic District School Board and K-12 Educator working in the area of technology and special education.



The group team building activity *Barnga* was a good interlude in the day's strategic planning discussion. It is a simulation activity about inter-cultural awareness that made participants realize that despite many similarities, people of different cultures perceive and communicate things differently or play by different rules. In playing the simple card game and moving from group to group the Committee members had to understand and reconcile their communication differences to function effectively in a cross-cultural group. The activity raised awareness of the necessity to adapt behaviours and adopt strategies to overcome these differences.

The simulation activity encouraged not only communication but also understanding while enhancing collaboration for the purpose of increasing the Committee's capacity to work effectively together.

Highlights from the Director of Education's Presentation

Director of Education Anne O'Brien informed the Committee that the Board has hired 27 new teachers of which half are for French Immersion programme.

The Durham Catholic School Board prepared a 5-year strategic plan for 2014-19 and has identified ten (10) strategic areas each with its priorities. Refer to the document located at the following link: http://dcdsb.ca/DCDSB/DCDSB/DCDSB/Discovery 2020 Strategic Plan Final.pdf

The Ministry of Education has three (3) priorities:

- 1. Building high levels of public confidence,
- 2. Taking care of children's emotional development they must feel safe, good about themselves to thrive, and
- 3. Equity and inclusive education.

Review of DCPIC Parent Survey 2014 Results – Refer to Appendix 2

Parents are the key ingredient to student success.

The Parent Engagement Survey is part of the Durham Catholic Parents Involvement Committee parent engagement initiative which is supported by the Durham Catholic District School Board.

The following documents the survey results from the Durham Catholic District School Board parents' responses to parent engagement questions, which explored issues related to parent engagement in their children's education.

The survey was provided online through Survey Monkey. It opened on April 29, 2014 and closed on August 19, 2014. A total of 143 surveys are included in the analysis – seen as a good representation of responses.

Nine (9) questions were presented in the following areas: communications with the DCPIC, involvement in school-based activities and events, parent involvement in volunteering for the school as well as topics of interest.

Note: Survey was free for the first 100 responses. Subscription is \$29/month.



Question 1: Which school(s) does your child attend?

All schools were represented across the board, except for the following:

- St. Leo (Brooklin, Whitby)
- Holy Family (Beaverton)
- Fr. Joseph Venini (Oshawa)
- John XXIII (Oshawa)
- Notre Dame (Ajax)
- St. Patrick (Ajax)
- St. Isaac Jogues (Pickering)
- St. Luke the Evangelist (Whitby)
- St. Marguerite D'Youville (Whitby)
- St. Theresa (Whitby)
- St. Paul (Whitby)

They are examples of those schools that need to be targeted. The primary schools which were the main target were mainly reached. These schools were informed to get in touch with a trustee.

The objective is to visit five schools. The following are selected for a Committee member to attend the November Council meeting. The School Council chair and principal will be notified in advance.

- John XXIII (Oshawa)
- Father Joseph Venini C.S. (Oshawa)
- Holy Family C.S. (Beaverton, Brock Township)
- St. Theresa C.S. (Whitby)
- St. Catherine of Siena C.S. (Ajax)

Question 2: What grade is your child or children in?

72% of parent of children in Kindergarten to Grade 3 responded. It is clear that a strategy is needed to reach the parents of older children.

Question 3: Are you aware of the Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (DCPIC) and what we do?

Although 51% are aware, a significant 33% do not know what the committee does.

DCPIC visibility will help in improving parent engagement. Discussions have been held on how to reach out to parents more as parent engagement is considered by the board as being a "rock".

DCPIC has used a number of methods:

- email
- orientation sessions
- DCPIC website
- school website
- social media
- Twitter

The goal is to reduce the 33% figure by half. The agreed upon plan outlined to reach over 20,000 students in 44 elementary and 7 high schools and to reach the 14% that are completely unaware of DCPIC involves:

- Having the DCPIC website link on every school's website because it is observed that
 usually parents will go on the teachers' section of the school website;
- Having a DCPIC member attend one of region's meetings;



- Send 2-sided Rap cards/post cards put DCPIC's meetings, event dates and a prayer (hoping it will be placed on the front of the fridge);
- A welcome postcard for the beginning September 2015 which must be developed by June 2014
- Focus on the events as the venue for parents to get to know DCPIC better. Events to be heavily promoted – for example, in school newsletters;
- Have more targeted events to younger audiences, JK to 2;
- Have online webinar broadcasts and invite parents;
- Partner with the chairs of local councils as was done at an event at St. John's Catholic School in Whitby (DCPIC brought a banner & tablecloth);
- Have a banner for each of the boards. Whenever there's a regional event, they are to be used. Cost of table top banner \$15 and that of a retractable banner is \$100. Decision for Kim Beatty to look into pricing and size. These smaller ones will then be placed into each school.

Question 4: How would you most like to receive information from the DCPIC?

Since an overwhelming 71% preferred to be contacted by email, the plan is to start with the email addresses that were included in survey followed by the list of emails from all those that have registered for an event in the last year on Eventbrite database. As well, need to use the DCPIC website subscriber list.

Combine all emails into a central distribution list that is to be updated continually and use for all communication.

A **newsletter** was also preferred; as was receiving information via the **School Council**. The objective is to have a quarterly newsletter. Two newsletters have been done and for the next



school year, will be doing a Welcome newsletter – bringing the number to three: September, Christmas, Easter. Preference is more towards having a newsletter versus a rack card.

Question 5: In the past year, which events hosted by the DCPIC did you attend?

Nearly 68% stated that they did not attend any event.

Some responses indicated that they could not get a sitter for their child. Child care must be highlighted that it is provided – therefore, for all upcoming events child care services will be better advertised. (Parents really like Early Childhood Educators to be present because they come with materials for play. The rate is \$25 per hour).

For those that did attend, feedback regarding the event needs to be collected. The use of a standard exit card with 4 questions such as "Would you come again?" was proposed. Since the committee does not favour the use of paper materials (due to lack of resource for collection and reporting), it was agreed to follow-up with an email immediately afterwards.

Events such as the **Orientation & Commissioning Mass,** for school chairs and principals is being held on October 29th this year (*last Wednesday of the month*) are annual events. Other events proposed and planned are:

- Dr. Jean Clinton "The Developing Brain: Why Kids Do the Things They Do" (October 14, 2014) Registration for this event is online and can be found on the DCPIC website.
- A **Christmas event** held during the Advent season is planned for this year. On November 21st, **Dr. Robert Wicks** a charming, funny and phenomenal speaker and author who writes about faith will be speaking. It presents an opportunity for DCPIC to ask that he speak to parents about faith-based education.
- The **Distinguished Catholic Volunteer Award** night will be held on April 15th as part of National Volunteer Week is also an annual event. This celebration of volunteers is being held the week of April 12-18, 2015. This will be the second year that the DCPIC hosts this



award ceremony that honours the service of one parent volunteer from each of the schools within our school board. This year and going forward all the recipients are able to bring their guests to the ceremony. The format for the ceremony will not be a sitdown dinner as was the case for the inaugural award ceremony. As well, part of the plan for the event includes obtaining the parent volunteers photos and posting them on the website in a new section. The request for a photo will be placed on the application. Schools will be encouraged to re-publicize the winners.

- Catholic Education Week is also an annual event celebrated by school boards and schools across the province, where students, teachers and parents celebrate teaching excellence and student achievement. This year's Catholic Education Week is being held from May 3 – May 8th 2015. The theme is 'Exploring Paths of Joy'. On the Friday, the school board will be holding mass including parents and hosting a Catholic education dinner.
- **PRO-Grant Events** if proposal is approved, there is a potential of 7 events to be added as the request was for each high school to put on this special event. Details to follow at the upcoming meeting.

In total, 4 events are confirmed; and 7 are potential events.

Question 6: What are the barriers for attending events, meetings, workshops, or volunteering in the school?

50% of the parents stated that they are too busy. It is hoped that with improvements made in advertising the complimentary childcare service, that barrier can be reduced. Some concrete steps can be done to greatly reduce the response rate of 30% for lack of information.

The newsletter and twitter are relatively new and DCPIC members will continue to build on that. More personal contact will also be a key factor in reducing the barrier as a result of lack of information.



To reduce the barrier of scheduling conflict, it was proposed to change the dates and times of the events and workshops – do morning, evenings and weekends.

Many respondents cited "Lack of notice" as a barrier – this was a result of technical issues experienced with the timing of posting and advertising. One solution offered is to send information on the year's events on the first day of school – this is planned for September 2015.

Question 7: How involved have you been with the school council at your child's school?

Half of the respondents are members of the school council and clearly the ones making the effort to respond to the survey.

Of concern are the 25% who do not know about the school council or are not sure how to get involved with school council.

Schedules are all online. Some councils have as few as five people on them. The majority of council members are women. Some cannot sit on two school councils when they have one child in elementary school and the other in high school. To get a greater turnout, it is proposed to communicate that they can attend every other meeting and send a spouse or a friend to alternate meetings they cannot attend.

Question 8: In the past year, how often have you discussed your child's school with other parents from the school?

38% have a weekly dialogue about the school. Of concern is negative dialogue concerning amalgamations and new boundaries forcing some students to change schools.

Question 9: Which of the following topics would you most like to learn about?

Math, Literacy and Social Media for Kids are the most popular topics.



The plan is to determine how we need to help parents do math, literacy and social media using a consultant. For example, a math coach. Math nights were very well attended last year by the younger children. The suggestion for this year is to have math nights for the older children.

Other topics on the list such as safe and accepting schools, healthy schools, mental health, navigating the school system also received a high response rate. The recommendation made is to pick one of these topics for each meeting and bring in a consultant. Agreement made to schedule the top 5 topics, and advertise much earlier. The presentation will be 20 minutes with 10 minutes added for questions. Following are the topics to be presented at DCPIC meetings beginning in October:

- Math Mike Shad
- Social Media & Kids Stacey Howe
- Literacy
- Homework Help
- Healthy Schools

DCPIC's Next Steps

- 1. DCPIC Chair to present the results of the parent survey as well as the results of the strategic plan by October or November to the Durham Catholic District School Board.
- 2. Enlist DCPIC members for Sub-committees (sub-committees to meet and hold efficient meetings, have a specific agenda and be well managed). Sub-committee tasks to be completed include:
 - selection of a Sub-committee Chairs
 - review task lists and prioritize the undertakings
 - set future sub-committee meeting dates
 - sub-committees are to present to the entire DCPIC at the meeting.



The September 11th meeting will determine who is on the subcommittees for 2014-15. The following subcommittees have been identified:

- Communications
- Faith Formation
- School Council & Parent Outreach
- Budget
- Policy (including Bylaws)
- PRO Grant
- Nominations members already selected (Chair: Eileen Bright, Anita Colacicco and Nancy Carpenter. This committee will dissolve once elections are done on October 9)
- 3. The process to review DCPIC's Working Bylaws (considered a "rock") is carried out biannually. Specifically, Section 5 needs close review.

Summary Thoughts

The Committee had a very stimulating and productive strategic planning meeting to kick off the 2013-14 school year.

Dyan Cato, a Parent Member of DCPIC, stated that the surveys should be done more frequently – a sentiment also echoed by another participant, Monique Forster.

Roxanne Horwitz, Chair of DCPIC, thanked everyone for their participation. The outline for the upcoming school year is shaping up well, which means the DCPIC is well prepared to start another successful year for parent engagement. She invited to move the planning session to the team building activity for a much needed time to get to know members in a relaxed and fun setting. Trustee Stack closed the meeting with a prayer.

The annual strategic planning session adjourned at 5:50 PM. The group moved into their team building activity.

Financial Statement	The DCPIC receives annual funding from the Ministry of Education which is \$5,000 plus \$0.17 per student (\$3769) to a total of \$8769. The DCPIC added monies to this year's budget due to previous year's carryovers in the amount of \$73,055.49. The total budget



was \$81,824.49 for 2013-2014. Included in this amount was \$11,500.00 for PRO Grant funding received from Ministry of Education.

The DCPIC spent \$61,152.64 in the 2013-2014 school year, and this brings the DCPIC total carry forward amount of \$24,999.22 to the 2014-2015 school year budget.

Parent involvement in our region is led by the Durham Catholic Parent Involvement Committee (DCPIC). This committee is composed of up to 16 parent members, up to 3 community members, trustees, the director (or designate), a principal, teaching staff and non-teaching staff whose mandate is to promote parent engagement in our school board.
